The hospital

• The **children's hospital 'Giovanni Di Cristina**' is a public pediatric hospital located in one of the oldest areas of Palermo, between the two neighbourhoods *Albergheria* and *Ballarò*.

• Its building houses **our Hospital School Section** which is under the authority of 'Liceo Scientifico Benedetto Croce' whose main task - as a *Regional Hospital School Centre* ('Scuola Polo Regionale') - is that of coordinating all the 13 Hospital School Sections operating in Sicily.


• The hospital is a **higly specialized pediatric centre** with a **First aid station** providing emergency care and treatment and **15 different Operating Units** (*Pediatric surgery, Cardiology, Anaesthesia and Intensive care, Dermatology and Allergology, Pneumonology and Pulmonary Rehabilitation, Nephrology, Child Neuropsychiatry, etc., ...)*

The Hospital School Section 'G. Di Cristina'

- Our Hospital School Section provides education and didactic support to hospitalized children and adolescents who cannot attend 'normal' classes because of their pathological condition.
- Teachers from different educational levels work at this Hospital School Section:
- Kindergarten (0-5 years old)
- Primary school (6-10 years old)
- Lower Secondary school (11-13 years old)
- Higher Secondary School (14-18 years old)

Our Student-Patients

- We work with Higher Secondary School Students who are enrolled in various public and private schools (lycées, technical and vocational schools).
- The disciplines taught are the so called 'common area subjects' such as:



^{*}Not all disciplines are taught in hospital and, in case a student needs support in other specific curriculum subjects, an additional educational provision can be offered by a Local Network of Schools.

Our Student-Patients

Our students are hospitalized in different Units (Pediatric Surgery,
Cardiology, Nephrology), but in recent years the great majority of
adolescents we work with are hospitalized in the Child
Neuropsychiatry Unit for both neurological and psychiatric
disorders.

Neurological disorders

- They receive care and treatment for **neurological disorders** such as:
- Epilepsy syndromes
- Migraines and Chronic Headaches
- Attention Deficit and Learning Disorders (ADHD)

Psychiatric disorders

- Unfortunately, over the last ten years, there has been a dramatic increase in the number of adolescents suffering from psychiatric disorders including:
- Mood and Anxiety disorders;
- Psychosis;
- Eating disorders;
- Substance abuse and new addictions
- Behavioural disorders
- Self-injury/ Cutting

Psychiatric disorders

Mood and Anxiety disorders:

Major depression, Bipolar disorder, Seasonal affective disorder, etc.

Substance abuse

(drugs, alcohol, medicines)

and new addictions

(mobile-phone and Internet addiction)

Psychosis:

Schizophrenia

Behavioural disorders

('Hikikomori' or social withdrawal)

Eating disorders:

Anorexia and Bulimia

The hospital teacher's task

 The main goal of our intervention is to guarantee the Right to Education for hospitalized children and adolescents according to their health conditions and individual needs as well as to ensure education for students with chronic diseases or for those who are convalescing at home and need educational support and monitoring after their discharge.

• Hospital teachers are required to plan, organise and deliver customized learning for their students, to set suitable targets and liaise with their 'home' schools. They generally work in partnership with a multi-disciplinary caring team.

Hospital teachers provide an 'educational care' which is an integral part of the patient's therapy.

The hospital teacher's task

Teachers help hospitalized children and adolescents:

- to maintain their **student-role**;
- to **facilitate learning** through the use of suitable strategies, methods and new technologies;
- to normalize their everyday life in hospital;
- To prevent/reduce school drop out and early leaving;
- To relieve back-to-school stress

The hospital teacher's task

Hospital teachers act as a *bridge* between the hospitalized children/adolescents and

- home school teachers and classmates (promoting the patients' inclusion and supporting their motivation)
- **external reality** (facilitating the adaptation of hospitalized students and their family).

The teaching approach

- The approach must be **empathic** and **flexible** focused more **on learning** rather than on teaching;
- Hospital courses must be **adapted** (as for time and tools) to the **health conditions** and **abilities** of the children/adolescents **in cooperation with the 'home school**'
- Lessons can be organized for individuals and small groups (either in the hospital classroom or at the bedside);
- A variety of teaching methods, strategies and resources shall be used to facilitate the learning process and prevent isolation.

The Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic on Hospital Schools

- In order to prevent virus transmission, hospital school sections were closed from March to September 2020.
- Covid-19 has deeply changed all our lives, transforming homes and hospital wards into virtual classrooms.
- During the lockdown period many children/adolscents have suffered from isolation and have tried to cope with it through distance learning.
- In September 2020, in order to re-organize a suitable learning and safe environment for hospitalized students, **new agreements containing strict safety measures and recommendations** were signed between the Regional School Offices (USR), the Regional Hospital School Centres and the different Hospital Administration Offices.

The Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic on Hospital Schools

- All patients and companions are screened with nasopharyngeal swabbing before being admitted;
- Teachers and visitors's temperature is always checked on arrival;
- Almost all teachers working in a hospital section have been vaccinated and are weekly swabbed;
- **Safety measures** are stricly respected (social distancing, use of face masks and other personal protective equipment, frequent handwashing, sanitizing surfaces and didactic materials).
